

Greetings PRHS families;

As we head into the busiest season for school, we would like to call your attention to some important information and schedule changes.

Changes to our Humanities Curriculum for 18-19 school year

Humanities teachers and I have been in the process of reviewing the Humanities (English and social studies integrated curriculum) for several years now. After reviewing several years of student achievement data, revising the curriculum, and reviewing our current instructional practices we have made the decision to end our current Humanities program beginning next year. Beginning in the 18-19 school year, students will be enrolled in separate English and social studies courses rather than Humanities courses. Making this change will better serve our students by: allowing teachers greater flexibility to create curriculum that engages students in their own learning, especially in English courses; reducing the student failure rate; reducing the number of students in need of summer school or credit recovery to make up No Credit grades; allowing more students with disabilities to access the academic area of their strength (English or social studies) without having to enroll in the double credit Humanities course.

Humanities has been a part of PRHS since our founding in 1999 so making this decision is a difficult one. There are many students who enjoy the approach to learning and have fond memories of the experience. Unfortunately, the need to change to respond to our student needs outweighs these positive benefits. Students and parents do not need to make any decisions as a result of this change. We will create student schedules for next year with the change in mind.

Reminder that there is no Wednesday early release until future notice.

Tuesday, April 10

All **Juniors** will take the SAT on Tuesday, April 10. This test is required by the state of Maine so attendance is mandatory. The test will take the entire day. Students must arrive to school ON TIME and we will be providing breakfast for all students. Students who are late for the start of school or are absent will be required to sit for the test on the make up date of April 24. Some students will complete the test before 2:10 and will be allowed to leave school before the final bell. All other students will have a regular day of school and will have all of their classes.

Wednesday, April 11

- **Juniors** will be taking the mandatory science test from 7:40-10:50. During this time: **Freshmen** will be in Roundtables working on career exploration activities to prepare for next year's sophomore exhibition; **Sophomores** will be preparing for Sophomore exhibition **Seniors** have the opportunity to work on their Senior Celebration either at home or in school. Seniors must arrive at school by 10:20.
- Students will have all of their classes after lunch.

Wellness Day April 13

We are dedicating Friday, April 13 to providing students with opportunities to focus on being healthy. We will be offering workshops to teach students healthy living topics as well as offering them opportunities to engage in physical activity. We are excited about this new day and are looking forward to the experience. This is a regular school day and attendance is expected like any other school day.

Quarter Grades will be posted on Wednesday, April 11 and mailed home April 13.

With the Gran Turismo and the winter sports season behind us, we at PRHS feel that spring cannot be much farther down the road. We hope that your family finds a reason soon to shrug off winter as well!

Attendance: Please remember to call your child's absence or tardy into the main office (998-5400 x124) beforehand or on the same day. If you miss that deadline, please contact us as soon as you can. We are most interested in setting the record straight and excusing absences when they qualify. In order to make sure we report accurate information to the state, we may on occasion request a doctor's note to verify an appointment or an illness.

Our school goal this year is an average of 94%. A good spring will get us to our goal! Thank you for all you do to promote your children's education by getting them ready for school every day.

Prom: Prom is May 12. The student handbook provides the following set of rules for attending Prom:

- 1. Only 11th and 12th grade enrolled students may purchase tickets. TICKETS MUST BE PURCHASED BEFORE THE DANCE. No tickets will be sold at the door. Enrolled PRHS students in 9th or 10th grade may attend Prom if invited by an 11th or 12th grade student.
- 2. Guests may be invited but must be approved by the Assistant Principal no later than the Wednesday before the dance (May 9). "Guests" are defined as students who attend other schools, homeschooled students, or individuals who are no longer in school (17-20 years old).
- 4. Administration will keep a list of students who are ineligible to attend prom. PRHS students may be ineligible for Prom if they have had any of the following:
 - --multiple out-of-school suspensions or suspension for a capital offense since the start of 2nd sem.
 - --any unserved disciplinary consequences assigned during second semester
- 5. Administration reserves the right to deny attendance to a school dance for any student if the student's attendance will create or exacerbate a dangerous situation, whether or not the student is otherwise eligible to attend.

Spring Reminders: With spring come skateboards and more exuberant student driving.

- 1. Please remember that students may not ride **skateboards** on school property. Students are required to pick the boards up once they enter the school's driveway and walk them to my office.
- 2. Students who **drive to school** must register their cars in the main office. The student will be assigned a numbered space and must park in it. Students are not permitted to park in the teacher lot. Driving irresponsibly or recklessly will result in the suspension of driving privileges.

Junior Privileges: Juniors who have achieved academic and Habits of Work success may be eligible for junior privileges. Students must have a first or last block academic support and will be held to the regular eligibility policy used for athletics and competitive co-curriculars. This policy can be found at the <u>PRHS website</u> in the Student Handbook.

DATES TO REMEMBER...

- <u>School Day SATs</u> will be on <u>Tuesday, April 10th</u> for all 3rd year students. These will be scores that students can use for college admissions. <u>Wednesday, April 11th</u> is <u>Science Augmentation testing</u> for all 3rd year students. Lots of testing so we need all juniors here for both of those days.
- <u>JUNIOR PARENT NIGHT</u> is Wednesday, April 4 at 6 PM in the PRHS Auditorium. Learn more about the college admissions and financial aid process.
- STARTING April 5- Mock Interviews will be held in the Guidance Office. We have a variety of college representatives, as well as community members in various careers, coming in to help our juniors practice their interview skills. We provide materials and information for both the interviewers and interviewes, and all students receive a rubric with feedback after the interview. Juniors may also count their summer job interviews, or college interviews held on campus this spring. Poland Spring Inn will be one of our interviewers doing real interviews for summer jobs. Hannaford will also be a new addition in light of the new store down the road.
- LRTC decisions will be mailed home during April vacation. Students will get a letter whether they got into their first or second choice or if they were waitlisted. Their schedules for 2018-2019 will be adjusted accordingly. LRTC Orientation will be June 5 for all admitted students.
- <u>AP EXAMS</u> start May 7 and run through May 18. PRHS will be offering exams in the following areas: *English Literature*, *Calculus AB & BC*, *Statistics*, *Biology*, *World History*, *U.S. Government & Politics*, *Computer Science Principles and English Language*. \$85.00 is the cost for each AP exam and some students have already paid their \$15.00 deposit billing information can be found on your student's IC account. We have told all students that if the cost is an issue, they need to see Ms. Bush.
- May 24 <u>COLLEGE FAIR</u> NEACAC College Fair at the Augusta Civic Center 9:00-11:30 AM. Over 200 colleges and universities from around the country will be there. We will be taking the whole junior class. If you do not want your student to participate in this field trip, please contact the Guidance Office.
- MAY 18 MAINE DAY at BATES. This is an Open House at Bates College for Maine families only. We encourage all of our students considering competitive colleges to take advantage of this program, including the essay writing workshop. Register through Bates Admissions at 786-6000 by May 1. Many juniors may be nominated by the counselors and will be receiving an invitation for this program. We are also considering bringing a group of interested juniors contact Mr. McFadden for more information.
- <u>COLLEGE VISITS</u> trips are running! We have small groups going to University of Maine (4/4), and Thomas (51) this spring. Priority is juniors who have not gone on the Gran Turismo. Contact Guidance for more information.
- JUNIOR CLASS MEETINGS with the Guidance Office started a few weeks ago. We meet weekly with the whole class to take about the college search process, college admissions, financial aid and scholarships..
- <u>JUNIOR APPOINTMENTS</u> will be starting in Guidance. Each student will meet with his/her counselor to go over course selections for next year, graduation requirements, and post-PRHS plans. It is an exciting time to be planning for senior year!
- SENIORS & SENIOR PARENTS/GUARDIANS—It is FAFSA completion time! Time to do those financial aid forms! About 55% of the class of 2018 has already done their FAFSA—that is great news!! Don't forget to check the Scholarship list on the web site weekly now. More and more local scholarships are coming in! Complete your FAFSA by May 1 to be eligible for a \$1000.00 Maine State Grant.

We wanted to share this info from our friends over at Safe Schools. "The headlines are growing surrounding youth suicide. Most recently, a 10-year-old girl from Colorado took her own life after a bullying incident was caught on camera. The correlation between social media, bullying/cyberbullying, and suicide is ever-present. The suicide rate for all age groups has increased 24% over the last 14 years, according to new data released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Suicide rates have tripled for girls aged 10-14, the highest growth of any group. With suicide rates increasing, the impact of the media, and social media channels spreading like wildfire, how can you protect your student?"

Excellent info from Safe Schools we feel parents and guardians need to be mindful of. "The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimate that about 1.5 million high school students experience abuse from a dating partner. The National Resource Center on Domestic Violence has a number of great resources for you to help protect your student from teen dating violence. Besides raising awareness on the topic, it's helpful to know warning signs of domestic abuse. Common signs and symptoms that a student may be the victim of dating violence include:

- Bruises.
- Unlikely explanation for injuries.
- Wearing heavy makeup to cover up bruises or wearing inappropriately heavy clothing to cover bruises.
- Missing class or withdrawing from campus activities.
- Injuries that occur with increasing frequency or severity.

Teen dating violence is often kept a secret because the parties involved tend to be inexperienced with dating relationships, have romanticized views about love, feel pressure from their peers to be in a relationship, and want to be independent from their parents or guardians."

When the Great Pyramid was built as a tomb for an Egyptian ruler around 2560 BC, it was easily the tallest man-made structure in the world at 481 feet high. Nearly 4,000

years later, it was STILL the world's tallest structure, until the completion of England's Lincoln Cathedral, which reached 525 feet into the sky in 1311. When the Washington Monument became the world's tallest at 555 feet more than 500 years later in 1884, it was still only about 100 feet taller than the Great Pyramid at Giza.
