Greetings PRHS families;

As we head into the busiest season for school, we would like to call your attention to some important information and schedule changes.

Tuesday, April 9

All **Juniors** will take the SAT on Tuesday, April 9. This test is both required by the state of Maine and RSU16 graduation requirement, so attendance is mandatory. The test will take the entire day. Students must arrive to school ON TIME and we will be providing breakfast for all students. Students who are late for the start of school or are absent will be required to sit for the test on the make-up date of April 24. Some students will complete the test before 2:10 and will be allowed to leave school before the final bell. All other students will have a regular day of school and will have all of their classes.

Wednesday, April 10

- Juniors will be taking the mandatory science test from 7:40-10:50. During this time: Freshmen will be in Roundtables working on career exploration activities to prepare for next year's sophomore exhibition;
 Sophomores will be preparing for Sophomore exhibition; Seniors have the opportunity to work on their Senior Celebration either at home or in school. Seniors must arrive at school by 10:20.
- Students will have all of their classes after lunch.

Financial Aid Night and Junior Parent Night

• Our guidance department is hosting an important event on Thursday, April 4. Junior families are invited to learn more about the financial aid process for college and the college admissions process for their soon-to-be seniors.

Quarter Grades will close on Friday, April 12, will be posted in Infinite Campus on Wednesday, April 24 and mailed home April 26.

With the Gran Turismo and the winter sports season behind us, we at PRHS feel that spring cannot be much farther down the road. We hope that your family finds a reason soon to shrug off winter as well!

Attendance: Please remember to call your child's absence or tardy into the main office (998-5400 x124) beforehand or on the same day. If you miss that deadline, please contact us as soon as you can. We are most interested in setting the record straight and excusing absences when they qualify. In order to make sure we report accurate information to the state, we may on occasion request a doctor's note to verify an appointment or an illness.

Our school goal this year is an average of 94%. A good spring will get us to our goal! Thank you for all you do to promote your children's education by getting them ready for school every day.

Prom: Prom is May 4. The student handbook provides the following set of rules for attending Prom:

- 1. Only 11th and 12th grade enrolled students may purchase tickets. TICKETS MUST BE PURCHASED BEFORE THE DANCE. No tickets will be sold at the door. Enrolled PRHS students in 9th or 10th grade may attend Prom only if invited by an 11th or 12th grade PRHS student.
- 2. Guests may be invited but must be approved by the Assistant Principal no later than the Wednesday before the dance (May 1). "Guests" are defined as students who attend other schools, homeschooled students, or individuals who are no longer in school (17-20 years old).
- 4. Administration will keep a list of students who are ineligible to attend prom. PRHS students may be ineligible for Prom if they have had any of the following:
 - --multiple out-of-school suspensions or suspension for a capital offense since the start of 2nd sem.
 - --any unserved disciplinary consequences assigned during second semester
- 5. Administration reserves the right to deny attendance to a school dance for any student if the student's attendance will create or exacerbate a dangerous situation, whether or not the student is otherwise eligible to attend.

Spring Reminders: With spring come skateboards and more exuberant student driving.

- 1. Students may not ride **skateboards** on school property. Students are required to pick the boards up once they enter the school's driveway and walk them to my office.
- 2. Students who **drive to school** must register their cars in the main office. The student will be assigned a numbered space and must park in it. Students are not permitted to park in the teacher lot. Driving irresponsibly or recklessly will result in the suspension of driving privileges. Our new School Resource Deputy, Jim Jacques, will continue checking for registrations and addressing parking and driving issues.

Junior Privileges: Juniors who have achieved academic and Habits of Work success may be eligible for junior privileges. Students must have a first or last block academic support and will be held to the regular eligibility policy used for athletics and competitive co-curriculars. This policy can be found at the <u>PRHS</u> website in the Student Handbook.

The calendar says spring and that we are on our way to summer?

DATES TO REMEMBER...

- ★ School Day SATs will be on <u>Tuesday</u>, April 9th for all 3rd year students. These will be scores that students can use for college admissions. Wednesday, April 10th is Science Augmentation testing for all 3rd year students. Lots of testing so we need all juniors here for both of those days.
- ★ JUNIOR PARENT NIGHT is Thursday, April 4 at 6 PM in the PRHS Auditorium. Learn more about the college admissions and financial aid process. FAME will also be presenting that night.
- ★ STARTING April 4— Mock Interviews will be held in the Guidance Office. We have a variety of college representatives, as well as community members in various careers, coming in to help our juniors practice their interview skills. A huge shout out to Terri Cook of Mechanics Savings Bank for speaking to the whole junior class about interviewing. We provide materials and information for both the interviewers and interviewes, and all students receive a rubric with feedback after the interview. Juniors may also count their summer job interviews, or college interviews held on campus this spring. Poland Spring Inn will be one of our interviewers doing real interviews for summer jobs. Hannaford will be participating as well.
- ★ LRTC decisions will be mailed home during April vacation. Students will get a letter whether they got into their first or second choice or if they were waitlisted. Their schedules for 2019-2020 will be adjusted accordingly. LRTC Orientation will be this June for all admitted students. Students can still apply to LRTC through their counselor. Priority does go to students who met the March 1 deadline.
- ★ AP EXAMS start May 6 and run through May 16. PRHS will be offering exams in the following areas: English Literature, Calculus AB, Statistics, Biology, Chemistry, World History, U.S. Government & Politics, US History, Computer Science Principles and English Language. \$35.00 is the cost for each AP exam and some students have already paid their \$15.00 deposit billing information can be found on your student's IC account. Students on free or reduced lunch only pay \$25.00 exam. We have told all students that if the cost is an issue, they need to see Ms. Bush.
- ★ May 23 COLLEGE FAIR NEACAC College Fair at the Augusta Civic Center 9:00-11:30 AM. Over 200 colleges and universities from around the country will be there. We will be taking the whole junior class. If you do not want your student to participate in this field trip, please contact the Guidance Office.
- ★ MAY 17 MAINE DAY at BATES. This is an Open House at Bates College for Maine families only. We encourage all of our students considering competitive colleges to take advantage of this program, including the essay writing workshop. Register through Bates Admissions at 786-6000 by May 1. Many juniors may be nominated by the counselors and will be receiving an invitation for this program. We are also considering bringing a group of interested juniors contact Mr. McFadden for more information.
- ★ <u>COLLEGE VISITS</u> trips are running! We have small groups going to UNE (4/20), CMCC (4/23) and Thomas (4/24) this spring. Priority is juniors who have not gone on the Gran Turismo. Contact Guidance for more information.
- **<u>TUNIOR CLASS MEETINGS</u>** with the Guidance Office started a few weeks ago. We meet weekly with the whole class to take about the college search process, college admissions, financial aid and scholarships.
- ★ JUNIOR APPOINTMENTS will be starting in Guidance. Each student will meet with his/her counselor to go over course selections for next year, graduation requirements, and post-PRHS plans. It is an exciting time to be planning for senior year!
- ★ SENIORS & SENIOR PARENTS/GUARDIANS—It is FAFSA completion time! Time to do those financial aid forms! About 55% of the class of 2019 has already done their FAFSA—that is great news!! Don't forget to check the Scholarship list on the web site weekly now. More and more local scholarships are coming in! Complete your FAFSA by May 1 to be eligible for a \$1500.00 Maine State Grant.
- ★ <u>CONSIDER ENGINEERING</u> this is one summer program that we strongly encourage students to check out. Held at UMaine, with 3 different sessions July 14-17, July 21-24, July 28-31. This is free with potential scholarships for UMaine. Deadline to apply is May 1 but this program fills up fast with only 102 spots available!! Applications will be available in Guidance or at https://mainepulpaper.org/consider-engineering/. Ask Jordon Gregory '18 what a fabulous program this is!
- ★ 9th GRADE PROGRAMS Select 9th graders will be invited to participate in an Aspirations program at Bowdoin College on April 12. Other 9th grade girls will be invited to be part of the Totally Trades conference at CMCC in May.

Poland Regional High School has been invited by the University of Michigan to participate in a nationwide survey of 10th graders, entitled *Monitoring the Future: a continuing study of American youth*. I am writing to ask your permission for your son or daughter to participate.

This annual survey, which is funded by the National Institutes of Health, has been tracking changes in the attitudes, opinions and behavior of American young people for the past 43 years. Its results are widely reported and are used by many organizations to develop better policies and programs that affect the nation's youth.

The 10th graders will be asked to complete a 40-minute questionnaire during regular school hours, which asks about school experiences, attitudes toward school and education, plans for the future, use of and attitudes about using alcohol and drugs, work experiences and preferences, and health and leisure activities. There are **no** questions about sexual behavior or abortion. Students are informed that their participation is voluntary and that they may skip any questions they wish. They usually find the questionnaire interesting and enjoy the opportunity to express their views. The enclosed brochure provides you with additional information about the study.

The questionnaires are anonymous—containing no names or other identifying information—and no school staff are involved in administering the questionnaires; review copies are available at the school. The school will receive a monetary contribution this year, as well as national reports from the study for each of the next three years.

What Is the Study About?

The questions cover a wide range of issues such as education, the school environment, use of free time, future plans, work, alcohol, drugs, and government policies. We believe that young people's experiences and their feelings about how things are now and how they ought to be in the future are important. In a sense, your answers will be a kind of vote on these issues.

The "votes" of all of the study participants taken together will be an accurate indication of American students' thoughts and experiences. Next year and in the following years, other students will also be asked for their ideas on these subjects so that we can find out how things change from one year to the next.

Why That Name for the Study?

We call it Monitoring the Future because we know that studying young people today will tell us a lot about what the whole nation will be like tomorrow.

Do I Have a Choice?

You certainly do! Your participation in this study is completely voluntary and you may skip any question you do not want to answer. After you have finished reading about the study, we think you will agree that it is important and exciting and that you will want to be a part of it.

Why Should I Participate?

A lot of people think they know all there is to know about young people, but their impressions are based on only a few people they know or on news headlines.

Your generation has a lot to tell the rest of the country about what you value, the problems that concern you, and some of the ways you would like things to change. More of you need to be heard. Many students say the questionnaire is interesting and that they enjoy filling it out.

Will Anyone I Know See My Answers?

No, your individual answers are never seen by anyone in your school, or anyone else who knows you. No participating person, school or school district can be identified in any report of study results. We even have a special Grant of Confidentiality from the U.S. government which permits us to protect all of the information gathered in the study.

How Are the Results Used?

We believe that a study like this is successful only if it makes a difference. Each year, educators, journalists and policy makers at all levels use the study results to help them better understand students' experiences and wishes. We present an annual report to the nation as a whole which is covered by television, radio, and many news organizations.

There are also special reports to many interested groups. For example, educators learn what students say about school and their feelings about further education. National leaders learn what issues are especially important to students now; community and business leaders learn about students' hopes and plans for the future.

Why My School?

In order to represent all students throughout the United States accurately, about 140 schools have been selected by scientific random sampling methods at each of three grade levels—8th, 10th, and 12th grades. Your school happens to be one of those chosen.

Who Is Doing This Study?

The University of Michigan's Survey Research Center is one of the world's largest and most respected social research organizations. It has been conducting nationwide surveys for more than 60 years. The study is funded by the National Institutes of Health.




